New Hampshire Self-Verification Guide

Detecting Possible Misuse of Benefits and Services in Your Name (Parents, Caregivers, and Guardians)

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Date: January 1, 2026

Purpose: This document provides a New Hampshire-specific, legally safe pathway for parents, caregivers, and guardians to verify whether public benefits or services were billed, paid, or claimed using their own identity or that of a dependent, and outlines official steps to take when discrepancies are identified.

Introduction

New Hampshire does not operate a centralized, public name-searchable clearinghouse for all public benefit payments or claims. Records are maintained by individual agencies under state and federal confidentiality laws. The correct approach is **self-verification**: reviewing official records you are legally entitled to access, then escalating concerns through formal dispute or fraud-reporting channels when appropriate.

Section 1 — Licensed Child Care Verification (NH DHHS)

Child care licensing and oversight in New Hampshire are administered by the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), Bureau of Child Development and Head Start Collaboration.

Section 2 – Child Care Scholarship / Financial Assistance (NH DHHS)

New Hampshire administers child care financial assistance through the New Hampshire Child Care Scholarship Program, funded in part by the federal Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF).

- Approved provider name and authorized dates
- Attendance versus authorized care

Section 3 — Health Coverage Claims (New Hampshire Medicaid)

Health services billed under New Hampshire Medicaid generate formal claims records. These records are the primary source for verifying whether services were billed in your name or your child's name.

Section 4 — Public Records Requests (New Hampshire Right-to-Know Law)

Public access to government records in New Hampshire is governed by the Right-to-Know Law (RSA 91-A). Records involving minors or health/benefit cases may be exempt; however, parents and guardians may request records they are legally entitled to receive.
